Contacting the School

Late Arrivals

With our 9:25 am morning bell, we are one of the latest starting schools in the area. Despite our relatively late start, we have a lot of students who are arriving to school after 9:25 am. The morning routine in classrooms is very important to set your child up for a successful day. Please ensure that, wherever possible and barring extenuating circumstances, your child arrives at school ready to enter class at 9:25 am and begin their day of learning. Children who arrive late need to visit the school office for a late note prior to heading off to class.

Parking in Local Streets

Please be mindful of local residents and do not park across their driveways. I have received a number of complaints recently about parents parking across driveways and blocking access into and out of homes.

Morning Drop Off

Thank you to our K-2 parents and carers who are dropping their children off at our drop-off zones each morning. Now that we are well into the school year, there is no need to walk your child to their classroom. Instead, please say your goodbyes at the gate or at the drop-off zone. The playground is supervised from 9:00 am. Please also be aware that 9:25 am is not an ideal time to try to catch your child's teacher, as they are about to begin the day of learning with their class. Teachers are only too happy to talk to you about your child. Please phone or email the school to request a suitable time if you would like to request a phone call or meeting with your child's teacher.

Kiss and Drop

Thank you to the majority of our parents and carers who use our Kiss and Drop properly, happily rolling forward when space becomes available in front of them. Driving as far forward as you can in the Kiss and Drop before collecting your child, then merging into Clower Ave down towards the end, allows cars to pull in at the start of the Kiss and Drop and helps with traffic flow.

NAPLAN

Each year the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is undertaken by students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Students will participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

NAPLAN 2024 will take place from Wednesday 13 March to Monday 25 March.

NAPLAN is just one part of our school learning assessment program. The tests assess literacy and numeracy skills your child is already learning at school.

In preparation for NAPLAN, our school will undertake activities to help students become familiar with the format and functionality of the online tests. These activities are not an assessment of student ability and will not be marked. Excessive preparation for NAPLAN is not required nor recommended.

The public demonstration site (https://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site) is available to see the types of questions, tools and functions used in the NAPLAN tests.

It is imperative that each child sitting NAPLAN has access to **headphones** or **earphones** that work. Please ensure that your child has their own set of headphones or earphones, that work, in preparation for the online assessments that involve your child listening to spoken instructions.

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) & Restorative Practice

Each week we focus on different aspects of PBL with our students. Our focus area for Week 7 is:

Week 7

PBL focus: All Settings; Treat others the way I want to be treated

PBL award for the week: Displaying responsible behaviour

Displaying responsible behaviour means making the right choices and treating others how you want to be treated. At school we need to be responsible in the classroom and on the playground. In the classroom, this could be following the class rules or expectations, or completing your work to the best of your ability. On the playground, this could mean looking after school equipment and following the rules of the games that you are playing.

Class News

Every few days we're sharing some class news with you via our Facebook page, as well as in our fortnightly newsletter. This fortnight it's KA, 1B, 2C and 5F's turn.

KA

Kindergarten students have kicked off Term 1 with great enthusiasm and we're impressed by how seamlessly our young learners have adapted to school life and classroom routines. KA students have delved into the exploration of letters and sounds, focusing particularly on the 'm' and 's'. Throughout these phonics sessions, KA have been introduced to characters such as 'Maggie Mouse' and 'Sammy Seal', engaging in activities like sorting pictures based on their initial sounds. In mathematics, KA students have immersed themselves in learning about numbers, patterns and sorting objects based on different attributes. They practised the correct formation of numbers and worked on recognising dice dot patterns. KA particularly enjoyed copying and continuing repeating patterns using both objects and pictures. Visual arts lessons in KA involved creating an artwork inspired by the story of 'The Kissing Hand' by Audrey Penn. Students crafted the protagonist, Chester the Raccoon, by using cut-and-paste techniques. It's been a fantastic few weeks of learning in KA, with our excitement growing each day!









1B

1B have made a great start to the year, connecting with old friends and building bonds with their new classmates. Students worked together to create a story about what they love most about our school. Their accompanying illustrations look wonderful on the classroom windows. In mathematics, students have been learning to count large collections of objects by grouping in tens and have been identifying patterns while skip counting. During visual arts lessons, they have explored different artists and are enjoying making a range of artworks. It's sure to be a great year ahead!

The goal is to be able to read in the same way that we talk, and 2C is well on their way to achieving that goal!

The Big Battery Rescue

On Monday 26 February, The Big Battery Rescue show entertained Rouse Hill Public School students with an informative presentation to launch the National Battery Recycling Challenge for 2024. The initiative provides schools and communities with free battery recycling kits that help save the environment by diverting batteries from landfill.

Each classroom will receive a small battery recycling bucket to deposit batteries that have been collected from home and at school. These battery recycling buckets will be emptied into a large battery recycling wheelie bin, located in the front office, for collection by an accredited battery recycler as needed throughout the year.

Our school will be rewarded with \$100 for each semester that 100kg of batteries are recycled. At the end of the year, the top 3 schools that recycle the most batteries (based on average weight per student) will receive the following rewards: \$2000 for 1st \$1300 for 2nd and \$800 for 3rd.

Last year, our school collected a massive 218kg of batteries in total, or 206.4g per student, finishing 20th in the state.

You are encouraged to either send in any batteries from home that you would like to recycle with your child to place in their classroom collection bucket or bring them to the front office to be placed in the battery recycling wheelie bin.

Please help us save the environment by diverting as many batteries from landfill as possible!



volunteer in the canteen or uniform shop


get behind the scenes at a fundraising even come along and have your say at a meeting
